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Bankers Life Company (Perfin B153) in Christmas Seals




Figure 2: Back (gum) side of sheet in Figure 1; flipped horizontally to show the BL(C) patterns in same orientation as seen in the sheet viewed from the vignette side.

At the 2023 Annual Convention in Charleston, SC I found the sheet of Christmas Seals shown as Figures 1 and 2 with all 100 seals perforated with perfin B153 (BL/C) used by Bankers Life Company. There are several interesting topics with regards to this sheet.

First, a few words about the Christmas Seals. This sheet was released during the 1939 Christmas season to raise revenue in support of programs sponsored by the, then, National Tuberculosis Association (now The American Lung Association), as explained in the four seals in the center of the sheet. Each seal has the (fund-raising) year as part of the vignette. Printers were known to put their mark on *only one* Seal in the sheet. Check the bottom right corner of the Seal in row 6, column 7. You will see the letter "D". This tells us that this sheet was printed by the Edwards & Deutsch Printing Company. Other printers were used concurrently with E&D, each using a different identifying letter: Eureka Printing Company used "E"; Strobridge Printing Company used "S"; and US Printing & Lithograph Company used "U".

Turning the sheet over, we see the B153 pattern in each of the 100 Christmas Seals. Most of the perfins are incomplete – with chads or dimples instead of cleanly punched holes. In fact, only one dozen are complete, clean punches of the pattern.

I couldn't find one punch that clearly matched B153A. However, looking at the punches in this sheet, we can see small variations throughout, especially in the letter B. The perforator appears to be a 10-die machine, with this sheet of Christmas Seals being sent through the perforator vertically. The Seals in the middle columns are especially poor.

Seals in column 8 (counting from the left), row 1 and row 9 appear to be closest to perfin B153A (notice the shape of the letter B). What concerns me is that the punches in other rows in column 8 are definitely different than those in row 1 and row 9. Could this have been a larger perforator, punching multiple rows and columns simultaneously? Perfin B153 is F rated, so that supports extensive use with a large perforator.

The many minor differences in the 100 punches demonstrates the importance of studying stamp multiples. I am thinking that perfin B153A (C+ rate) is just another minor die variety, but I cannot prove it from this sheet. Perhaps your eyesight is better than mine and you can spot pattern B153A in this sheet.

The late Bob Schwerdt wrote an article about perfins in Christmas Seals, which was published in the *Bulletin* (Nov/Dec 2003:172-173) and follow-up information in (May 2004:82). Bob took a wider look at perfins in Christmas Seals, reporting on perfins in stamps from Denmark and one from France as well as with U.S. perfins and personal punches. His first article shows U.S. perfin H076 (HF/M) used by Henry F. Mitchell in Philadelphia. The articles are available on our Club website.

In conclusion, I ask members if they have other Christmas (or Easter) Seals with other perfins. Please report them to the Club via an article in the *Bulletin*.

This sheet is an example of the interesting and unexpected things we can find at the annual Conventions. See you in St. Louis in August 2024.

651 additions and corrections for the *Catalog* were submitted in 2023 by 25 Club members. The quality of our *Catalog* continues to improve with the information that you provide. Thank you! The majority (81%) of the additions have consisted of new postmark data and updates to the stamp usage periods. 

Can Anyone Help with More Information

-- H039R from H092? --

We all come across items from time to time that requires additional study. Being fairly new to Perfin study, I want to first share my thoughts and research process. I'm not normally looking for something singular, rare, or valuable, as much as I am trying to find a logical explanation and understanding of..... "what happened here?"

Last night I was poking through my shoebox full of perfins and came across this H039R with an extra punch on the backside of the "C". It was in a Sc#642 10¢ Monroe (1926-31).



Naturally I had to stop and try to think it through. I knew something was up with this perfin by the "x" on the information page and the "R" designation in the catalog number. "R" indicates that this perfin was the result of a different existing perfin being revised, normally by removing a letter to form the new pattern. Going to the supplemental information at the end of the letter pages, I read that H039R was formed by removing the "J" from pattern H092, thus leaving the letters H and C. I guess I could have just dropped it there and assumed a sloppy job converting the H092 to the H039R, but I like to study up on the companies involved.

When I looked up the Hajoca Corp. of Philadelphia, I found a very interesting company established in 1858 distributing plumbing, heating and industrial supplies. This company still flourishes today, under private ownership, and has a multitude of smaller companies within its corporate structure. If any of you have swimming pools, the Hajoca name may be familiar to you, as they are the leading provider of swimming pool plumbing in the country.

When I went to H092 it took a few minutes to realize what happened here. It was used by the Haines, Jones, & Cadbury Company also of Philadelphia. My first thought was of chocolate Easter eggs, but I found they too were in the plumbing supply business. Seeing that the period of usage was from 1913-17, I figured they went out of business and that Hajoca procured their perfin and had it revised for their use.

Then.... "lightbulb"..... **Haines, Jones, & Cadbury** made perfect sense. It seems as though Hajoca Corp. started out as Haines, Jones, & Cadbury, but reduced the name to Hajoca early on. I did find Haines, Jones, & Cadbury doing business as Hajoca at one time, but the name fell away in time.

In 2004 Haines, Jones, & Cadbury reappeared as a wholesaler of supplies out of Bentonville, AK, and there is a Haines, Jones, & Cadbury supply depot in London, Ontario, Canada. Neither of these companies are shown to be subsidiaries of, or related to, the Hajoca Corporation of today (at least that I can find).

Before the night was over, I had to send a scan to Steve Endicott to follow-up and see if he would have any further information on this perfin with the extra punch. Steve has a lot of patience with me and my questions and always gives me good information. He added that I needed to go to the Perfin Cover Exhibit on the Club's website and look at the H092 cover shown there. It would confirm my thoughts about the two companies. (Note that the corner logo on the envelope carries both names of the company, and the stamp was cancelled in August 1913.)

Steve also shared an image of a pair of 5¢ blue Roosevelts which shows H029 both with and without the extra hole.



My queries to the group;

- can anyone add any pertinent information about these companies; and
- does anyone have a H039R with more than the one errant punch remaining from the removal of the "J"?

Defining "Standards" for "Collectability" of Perfins

Over two years ago I received an e-mail to the Editor from Bill Sinesky (#4176) which I quote below.

As a relatively newer member, I don't think I've ever seen a bulletin article that codified the standards for collectible perfins. Has this already been done at some point? If so, it might be valuable to rerun.

If not, I think this would be very helpful as newer members start to buy/sell/trade with "older" members – especially regarding areas such as extraneous holes, double strikes, blind punches, thins and clipped stamps, etc. I realize collecting is entirely up to the individual and is also influenced by the rating, but offering standards should be a good starting point.

I realize you'll always have different opinions, but I think there would be points we all could agree on or maybe I just haven't had interactions with enough members.

First let me say that I don't believe that a set of general standards for "collectability" exist for any branch of stamp collecting. Standards do exist to evaluate the overall *condition* of an item (clipped corners, pulled perfs, scuffs, stains, etc.), the physical appearance of the vignette (centering, color, freshness, etc.), the genuineness of an item, and many other things which affect the value of a stamp. *Collectability* is, however, a subjective interpretation to which objective parameters are very difficult, if not impossible, to apply.

Rather than attempting to define standards, I think the question is more simply what are the characteristics of a perfinned stamp which makes it a *desirable* acquisition? And the answer to that question is nuanced by many considerations. The answer depends on just what you wish to collect and how you intend to mount or otherwise display relevant items.

If your goal is to collect one of each pattern listed in a catalog, with stamps mounted vignette down (back side displayed for ease of seeing the perf pattern) then the vignette is of lesser importance, and the appearance of the back of the stamp is important. My recommendation here is to find the cleanest copy of the base stamp with all perfs and corners intact. The ideal is to find this 'perfect' stamp with a complete (no holes blind or missing) well-centered perf pattern, with no random holes and no double punches (scuffed vignettes might be of lesser importance). For perfins with ratings of B+ down to F this ideal is achievable. For A and A+ rated patterns it may be necessary to relax your ideal, recognizing the scarcity (and hence lack of availability) of these high-rated perfins. If you happen onto an inexpensively priced A+ rated pattern in a stamp which is dirty and missing a corner or two and also a few perfs are pulled, buy it! – you may never see another copy of that pattern other than in a catalog.

And there the simple answers end. As for other collectable stamps, thins, pulled perfs, holes, clipped corners and even natural straight edges are commonly considered to be defects which downgrade the desirability of the item. For perfins; double punches, missing holes, random holes, and dimples (blind punches) must be added to the list of defects which affect desirability.

However, should you be so inclined, collecting double struck or broken patterns might be a fun sidelight, or even a serious collection interest, especially if the doubling involved different patterns or different orientations of the same pattern or the broken pattern documents the relative position of broken pin patterns on a multi-die perforator head. Making a study of perforator deterioration might involve collecting all the broken pin varieties of a pattern which you can find, especially in pairs or other multiples. Suddenly "defective" perfins have become desirable, collectable items.

If you have a special interest in a specific *issue* of stamps with perfins (Schermack Type III security perforated coils, Series of 1902 stamps, perfins in the Pan Pacific Exposition issues,) you may wish to display these stamps face up. Condition of both sides of the stamp suddenly becomes important; but now the condition/appearance of the vignette takes the driver's seat. A heavy cancel will make a stamp less collection worthy than a neat, light cancel. Completeness of the perf pattern is still a consideration, but it and centering of the perf pattern often becomes less consequential. Uniqueness of the stamp/perfin may ultimately drive your potential purchase.

I guess what I am saying is that we can develop standards for the overall *condition* of perfins ("Very Fine" down to "Space Filler"), and we can apply these to *desirability*, to a point, but their *collectability* is a matter of personal preference. My feeling is that any such system of "standards" would normally apply primarily to the obverse (back) side of the perfinned stamp and ignore the vignette side, but even that statement, as noted above, has serious exceptions.

The Most Valuable Perfin?

Arnold H. Selengut, (#3058)

The so-called "headache" perforated Washington-Franklin and Fourth Bureau Issues are some of the rarest and most expensive varieties of US 20th Century stamps. These are stamps that were erroneously perforated Perf. 10, instead of the intended Perf. 11, either on the top or bottom of the stamp. On one stamp, the 25¢ Fourth Bureau, a horizontal format stamp, the erroneous perforation is on the right or left edge, not the top or bottom.

There are about 130 different stamp/precancel combinations known to exist on these stamps. By this I mean that when one counts each of the stamps that exist with the variety, and each precancel that is known on that stamp, the total known quantity (excluding duplicates) is about 130. For example, the 10¢ Fourth Bureau headache perf. stamp, Scott #562c, is known with the following eight (8) precancels:

IA, Osage 521 (2)
MN, Minneapolis 205 (2)
NY, Brooklyn 219 (3)
NY, Palmyra 457 (5)

NY, Poughkeepsie 517 (1)
OH, Cleveland 225 (3)
OH, Troy 455 (1)
TN, Nashville L-1 E (2)

Several of these stamps have multiple copies reported. The number shown in parentheses above, following the precancel type, is the quantity of each reported to date. If one counts all of the reported precanceled Scott #562c stamps, the sum is 19. The total number of all precanceled headache perf. stamps reported, including duplicates, is about 190.

Among all 190 precanceled headache-perforated stamps, there is only one that is also perfinned. The perfin is P185 of the Penton Publishing Company of Cleveland, OH, an E rated perfin which puts it in the common category. This stamp was recently certified by the Philatelic Foundation. Its certificate #598733 is shown nearby. Note that the PF has mistakenly typed the perfin designation where the precancel type should have been shown.

Consider that the basic, correctly perforated stamp without the variety catalogs only 35¢, the very common precancel catalogs only 15¢ and the common perfin value is about the same. However, the *Scott Catalog* value of #562c is \$12,500. I submit that this unique item is likely the most valuable stamp among all perfins and perhaps among all stamps in the perfin universe. Does anyone have another candidate?

At the recent North Charleston, SC convention, one of our members correctly identified another headache perf. stamp, this one a Scott #511a, the 11¢ 1917 Washington Franklin with precancel type #558 from Racine, WI. It pays to know about these perforation rarities and to be on the lookout for them.



Cork Cancels and One With a Perfin

When postage stamps were first introduced in the United States, postmasters were instructed to deface postage stamps, but were not told how to do this. Clerks would use whatever was convenient, including pens and "PAID" handstamps.

Some post offices started to use cork bottle stoppers dipped in ink. Dipping the complete cork top could blot out the entire stamp, making it difficult to check the denomination, and so clerks began to carve grooves into the cork.

The carving process sparked the creativity of clerks across the country, and soon many designs appeared, ranging from shields, skulls, stars, geometrical shapes, animals, plants, hats, boots, and devils with pitchforks. Among the most common

fancy cancel designs are various designs of stars and crosses. The Waterbury, Connecticut post office was the most famous for this creative practice, making new fancy cork cancels for holidays and special occasions.

Their "Waterbury Running Chicken" cancel, perhaps a turkey, appeared close to Thanksgiving in 1869. It was in use for only a few days. It is probably the most prized of all 19th century fancy cancels.

As a short sidebar: On October 3, 1963, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of thanksgiving to be celebrated on Thursday, November 26. Prior to 1863, the celebration of thanksgiving was observed by individual States. Some did not want the Federal Government to do this, arguing State's Rights; and Southerners were reluctant to accept this holiday since they viewed it as a celebration of the Pilgrims in the North.

The cover shown here with a November 29, 1869, cancel and with three running chickens was auctioned by H.R. Harmer in New York on June 24, 2022, for \$310,000. Too rich for me! If interested, visit the archive section of their auction website. You will find quite a few interesting fancy cork cancels. I could be interested in them – if I had money to burn.



The Waterbury Running Chicken Cover

This is obviously many years before perfins were used in the United States, so why write about them in *The Perfins Bulletin*?



Recently, I found perfins F186 [FSB – diagonal] in a 9c Franklin postage stamp, Sc# 509 issued in 1917. The user is Frank S. Betz Company in Hammond, IN. They used perfins in stamps issued from 1912 to 1917, although we have only found covers with postmarks in 1912. This is a poor, split perfins with missing holes, in a stamp with a clipped corner, and it is a common D rate perfins. However, the cork cancel makes this an interesting item. This is many years after the 19th century use of fancy cork cancels in the United States.

I showed this stamp to perfins and precancel collectors at the North Charleston, SC Convention in August 2023. Everyone agrees that it is most probably a cork cancel. Jim Callis thought of a plausible explanation. This is a 9c stamp, so it was probably affixed, along with other postage, to a parcel. Perhaps one or more of the stamps were not cancelled. Rather than use a Sharpie (or its equivalent) to completely ruin the stamp (Thank Goodness!!) as is often done these days, the clerk may have reached into a drawer and pulled out a cork cancel device that had been there for many years.

Are there other late uses of cork cancels? Are there any others with perfins? Do you have any?

Clark Buchi 1941 – 2023

Clark Buchi closed his albums for the last time in June 2023. Clark was a member of the Perfins Club for 11 years, joining in December 2012. He was an avid stamp collector in many areas, but most of us knew Clark through his eagerness in seeking out United States perfins. He had an amazing sense of humor which he regularly shared with everyone; we all loved Clark for his friendship and humor. He always had nice things to say about everyone; not a negative word out of his mouth – ever. Clark served as our *Bulletin* editor for short period of time, served as a Director on the Executive Board, and most recently served as Club Librarian, linking our resources with the APRL. He was always willing to help.

Clark started collecting stamps as a ten-year-old boy. Like most of us, he took time off from stamp collecting during college. He earned his Bachelor of Engineering degree from Vanderbilt University, where he met, as he once wrote “my best friend for life, Judy” whom he married after graduation in 1963. Clark then served in the U.S. Army at the Engineering School at Fort Belvoir. He was the president of their family business, the Buchi Plumbing Company in Nashville, TN for around 45 years. His grandfather started the company in 1922. Clark retired around 2016, handing the management of the business to the next generation (the 4th) in the family. Clark, along with family and employees, celebrated the 100th anniversary of Buchi Plumbing Company in 2022.



Clark was predeceased by his daughter Kim, whom he adored and spoke of to close friends. Clark is survived by his wife Judy, his daughter Catherine Rector, her husband, and 2 grandchildren.

Judy had Clark’s portrait (shown above) painted by a close family friend. Judy recently told me “This is how I saw Clark many, many times and I asked her to capture it”. Clark will be fondly remembered and very much missed by all of us.

Apparent Discrepancy Between User and Owner of P124 Explained

Shown above is a cover strip electronically cropped from a double rate cover to General Electric from the NY Central Railroad office in Youngstown, Ohio, which I recently acquired. The Liberty series 4¢ Lincoln stamps (Sc.# 1036) are perfined 'PLE' for the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie RR. The PLE connected Pittsburgh with Youngstown and carried raw materials, heavy tonnage freight.


In 1880, Wm. Henry Vanderbilt brought the PLE into the New York Central system, which explains the apparent disconnect between the perfin and the return address. Wikipedia has an adequate article on the PLE. The cover is postmarked November 3, 1961.

A Jell-O Prepper

edited from a note from John Williams (#4037)

From a precancel mixture purchased at the annual Wichita Stamp Club show came several interesting stamps, among them this J42 L-2TS prepper, in Sc# 582, from the home of the original Jell-O factory, LeRoy, NY.

The original company to create Jell-O was the Genessee Pure Food Company. There are no "G" patterned perfins for the Company which apparently preferred to use product based advertising in their stamps. The company was renamed the



Jell-O Company from 1923-1925, at which point the pattern, which is reported in stamps used beginning with issues of the Series of 1902, reflected the new company name as well as the product name.



In 1925 Postum Cereal Company Ltd., of Battle Creek MI, acquired Jell-O. Postum Cereal's perfin (P37; P(LE)) replaced 'JELL/O' perfined stamps on the company's mailings. Thus, the 'Jell-O' perfin is not reported in stamps issued after 1925.



Netherlands "Snowflakes" Revisited



"I don't know what to say about this interesting, well placed simple punch in the VFW stamp. Someone was very careful with their punch device..."

The stamp is A Sc# 1525, issued to commemorate the &75th Anniversary of "Veterans of Spanish-American and other foreign wars". Unclear from the punch is whether the user had something against war, eagles, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, organization, modified Maltese Crosses, ..., or was simply playing with the punch (the most likely explanation).

Regardless, Steve has it absolutely right – this is impressive placement of the cutout using, probably, a handheld punch.
