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GB Queen Victoria £5 orange

During the Covid lockdown period, which we experienced here in the United Kingdom during 2020, I had a joyful moment. I managed to acquire a very rare British perfin. A copy of the 1882 £5 orange with perfin "C.I.H./&S" (C3730.02) used by C J Hambro & Son, merchants and bankers, 70 Old Broad St, London.



The British branch of C J Hambro & Son was formed in 1839 by Carl Joachim Hambro (1807-1877) who was born in Copenhagen, Denmark, the only son of Joseph Hambro and Marianne von Halle. The bank remained in family ownership until 1998 when it was sold to the French bank Société Générale.

The bank used four different perfin dies between 1868 and 1910. The most common die is (C3730.02) which can be found on most of the Queen Victoria and King Edward VII stamps issued during that period.

Whilst my £5 orange bears a Lombard Street cancel, it is thought unlikely that the stamp was used postally. Any letter or parcel it was applied to would need to have weighed over 50 lbs. to warrant its use. A more likely usage would be to pay for a bulk mailing of perhaps 2400 postcards or trade cards with ½d postage each.

The £5 orange was issued in sheets of 56 stamps with corner letters at the bottom ranged from AA to DN. How intriguing that the corner letters of this example are CH, a coincidence, I'm sure.

I believed that mine was a unique example of the £5 orange with a perfin, until I recently read an article posted by GB Perfin Society catalogue editor Roy Gault on the society's website. His paper records details of some of the pioneer collectors of GB perfins, one of whom was Charles Jennings who had recorded a memoir of his life and career.

He describes how he had amassed a GB perfin collection of almost every stamp issued, even one of the rarest: "*The £5 orange had eluded me for years until a London dealer offered me an excellent specimen with the H.S.B. perfin of the Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank.*"

He states that he sold his GB perfins to a lady from America. I've discussed this with Roy Gault and he believes that lady may have been Barbara Kloss whose own collection I understand was sold via the Perfins Club in June 1988. Was the £5 orange perfin "H.S.B" in that sale and was it acquired by another Club member?

So, my question to my fellow members is, can one of you show me a scan of my £5 orange's cousin? It would be wonderful to see it. My email address is w.hall13@ntlworld.com

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Stamps with Picturesque Cancels - and Perfins

In this article I will discuss two picturesque cancels on stamps that also have perfins. Of course, many slogan cancellations exist on postage stamps; however, I will arbitrarily limit the discussion to focusing on cancels that have interesting illustrations. The Smokey Bear cancel shown here was the first one to catch my attention and that started my journey down this rabbit hole. This is perfin U056 (U/OF/M), a common F-rated pattern used by the University of Minnesota in a Scott #1031 (dry printing) 1c George Washington stamp issued in 1954.

At the outset, let me explain that the bear's name was 'Smokey Bear', not 'Smokey the Bear' as many of us might mistakenly recall. In 1952, Steve Nelson and Jack Rollins wrote a song named "Smokey the Bear". They added 'the' to Smokey's name to keep the song's rhythm.

Smokey Bear was a five-pound, three-month old black bear cub, found in a tree in 1950 during the Capitan Gap Forest Fire on the Lincoln National Forest in New Mexico. Smokey had climbed a tree to escape the fire, but his paws and legs had been burned. New Mexico Department of Game and Fish Ranger Ray Bell took the cub to Santa Fe, where he and his family cared for the little guy. They offered the cub to the U.S. Forest Service provided that Smokey would be dedicated to a conservation and wildfire prevention publicity program.

Smokey Bear lived at the National Zoo in Washington D.C. for 26 years. During that time, he received millions of visitors and so many thousands of letters addressed to him that in 1964 the United States Postal Service assigned him his own ZIP Code -- 20252.

Stepping back in time a few years, in 1944 the U.S. Forest Service had started a campaign encouraging forest safety, and focusing attention on the prevention of forest fires. A bear was chosen as the 'spokesperson' based on a sketch by Forest Service artist Harry Rossoll. The bear's name was inspired by "Smokey" Joe Martin, a New York City Fire Department hero who suffered burns and blindness during a 1922 rescue.

Returning to perfins, postage stamps and Smokey Bear cancels, here are two stamps with Smokey Bear. Figure 2 shows a 10c commemorative stamp from the Rural America series, Scott #1506 issued in 1974 with a fuller Smokey Bear slogan cancel (Smokey & "Remember/only you can/PREVENT/FOREST FIRES"; but no perfin), from Paul Mistretta's USDA Forest Service-related memorabilia collection. Figure 3 is a 20¢ commemorative stamp honoring Smokey Bear, Scott #2096 issued in 1984. The copies with perfins are the personal punch RP033.5 (right hand illustration), used by Roberta Coleman in Clearlake, CA.

The second picturesque cancel I want to share is one presenting Paul Revere's Midnight Ride.

Recently I came across this 6c 1938 Presidential issue with an interesting, partial pictorial cancel. Dan Baugher, Mike Sterrett and Paul Mistretta helped me identify it as being Paul Revere on his horse. Later, Paul found an illustration of a cover with the complete slogan cancel, shown below (Fig. 6).

On the evening of April 18, 1775, Dr. Joseph Warren summoned Paul Revere to give him the task of riding to Lexington, Massachusetts, with the news that British soldiers stationed in Boston were about to march into the countryside northwest of the town. According to Dr. Warren, these troops planned to arrest Samuel Adams and John Hancock, two leaders of the Sons of Liberty, who were staying in Lexington. It was thought they would then continue on to the town of Concord, to capture or destroy military stores - gunpowder, ammunition, and several cannon - that had been stockpiled there. In fact, the British troops had no orders to arrest anyone; Dr. Warren's intelligence on this point was faulty, but they were very much on a major mission out of Boston. Paul Revere contacted a friend (probably Robert Newman, the sexton of Christ Church in Boston's North End, now known as the Old North Church) and instructed him to hold two lit lanterns in the church tower as a signal to fellow Sons of Liberty across the Charles River in case he was unable to leave town.

The lanterns were a predetermined signal stating that the British troops planned to row "by sea" across the Charles River to Cambridge, rather than march "by land" out Boston Neck. "One, if by land, and two, if by sea", was the phrase Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote in his poem, *Paul Revere's Ride*.

After being ferried across the river by friends and borrowing a horse, Paul Revere left for Lexington at about 11pm. Narrowly avoiding capture just outside of Charlestown, Revere changed his planned route and rode through Medford, where he alarmed Isaac Hall, the captain of the local militia, and informed him of the British movements. Revere then traveled on to Lexington.

The stamp shown in Figure 4 (off cover) includes the common perfin C219 [CNB] used by the Chase National Bank in New York City. The slogan cancel "In The Spirit of Paul Revere – Buy U.S. Defense Bonds", is financial in nature, appropriate for a bank.

A Study of Laser-Cut Holes in Postage Stamps Using Microscopy

In 2018 I was excited to finally locate an engraver who would create for me a seven-hole "L" perfin pattern by means of software.^{1,2} Employing a laser machine as the perforator, he cut the "L" perfin in modern U.S. postage stamps. The perfin appeared to be very good at first glance. I first noticed that there was something wrong with the perfin holes when I magnified them using a digital microscope connected to a computer.² I was able to see that they were eccentric holes with burnt residue around the perimeters. Given the quality of the holes, it was difficult to justify the high cost for the services. Nevertheless, caught in the moment, I plunged into a study of modern U.S. Christmas seals in 2019 because of my interest in Danish Christmas seals with perfins. As before the laser holes in the seals with self-adhesive gum were acceptable, and I was happy to use the perfin seals on my holiday mail.³ As I grew dissatisfied by the results of my experiments, I decided it would be best to stop tinkering for a while. I wanted to look at a few laser-cut decorative designs cut in international postage stamps. Their predecessors predated my perfin by many years.⁴ Specifically, I was intrigued by the small round holes cut in the face of the stamps. I magnified the holes to determine if they were good enough to serve as perfin holes.

When I examined the printed side of the 2018 United Nations souvenir sheet with water activated gum for Macao's 35th Asian International Stamp Exhibition, I was impressed with the finely made holes with crisp outlines, the absence of combustion deposits and the small degree of eccentricity.⁵ The round holes in the 2011 Liechtenstein Chinese New Year souvenir sheet with self-adhesive gum were of similar quality as those on the previous sheet.⁶ With the 2016 Switzerland flower and butterfly souvenir sheet with water activated gum, I found it lacked a sufficient number of round holes for study.⁷ In addition I noticed a thin white band around the perimeter of the holes in the Liechtenstein and Switzerland sheets, a telltale sign I had previously noted with my laser-cut perfin holes.^{1,2} In contrast the white bands were absent around regular perfin holes punched by mechanical perforators.²

After learning that other lasers performed very well, I resumed my laser work in 2021 focusing on stamps with water-activated gum to determine whether our setup was impacted by the adhesive's properties. Stamps of the 2002 Hawaii missionary souvenir sheet (Scott #3694) were cut with the "L" pattern that was configured to meet the dimensions of the sheet. Viewing a video cited below on the laser perforation of postage stamps may be useful to readers to visualize a laser machine at work.⁸

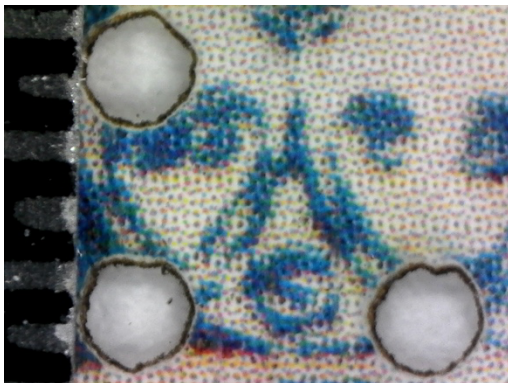


Fig. 1: Laser-cut perfin holes in the 2002 Hawaii Missionary sheet (Sc# 3694) with water-activated gum.

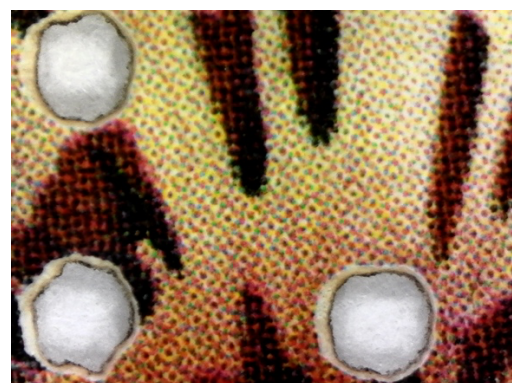


Fig.2: Laser-cut perfin holes in the 2017 seashell postcard rate stamp (Sc# 5166a) with self-adhesive gum.

Gum was indeed not the issue of our difficulties. When we drilled the stamps with water-activated gum, eccentricities and black deposits were observed again when magnified (Figure 1). For comparison Figure 2 illustrates the enlarged laser holes from a pane of 2017 seashell postcard rate stamps (Scott #5166a) with self-adhesive gum that were cut in 2018 using the same laser.¹ When the stamps were cut from the printed side of the missionary stamp or the adhesive side, both runs produced nearly equivalent results. The exception was the white borders around the edges of the holes when drilling was from the printed side. When drilling from the gum side, this was not the case. Lastly, when the "L" perfin was cut in plain white paper lacking gum, our results were no different from the results with stamps with self-adhesive or water-activated gum.

In three trials conducted between 2018 and 2021, a suboptimal laser result was obtained in each instance based on microscopy. The results suggested a new approach to overcome the limitations. So it was no surprise to me, then, when I learned that after the last experiment, the laser machine used by my engraver despite its pristine appearance was purchased

in 2005 and had not been upgraded. Unlike this hobbyist, the postal administrations discussed in this article probably had used high-tech laser machinery for stamps released in 2011 - 2018. Liechtensteinische Post reported that the Chinese zodiac series was made using “ultramodern laser technology” in order to produce the high-quality result.⁹

Ed. note: For your enjoyment below are shown three of the items George refers to in his article. The first is the U.N. sheet described above. The second is Liechtenstein's 2011 Chinese New Year souvenir sheet with self-adhesive gum and laser cutouts. The four stamps in the sheet have the background behind the dragon cut out by laser shows as black in the sheet as can be confirmed from the single stamp placed on a buff background.

The stamps & the illustration on lower row (not to scale) show the laser cut-outs; the UN & Liechtenstein single stamps are superimposed on a backing of a different color than that backing the SSs in the top row. Comparison of the pairs of images show clearly the shape of the cut-outs. The illustration at the right in the second row shows the laser cutting of the Swiss sheet. Note that the two left items show no discoloration around the laser cut shapes or perforations, while the Swiss item does (white edges around holes) as seen in the enlarged image at the right.

4. Were there electric machines in use in the USA after the War? “

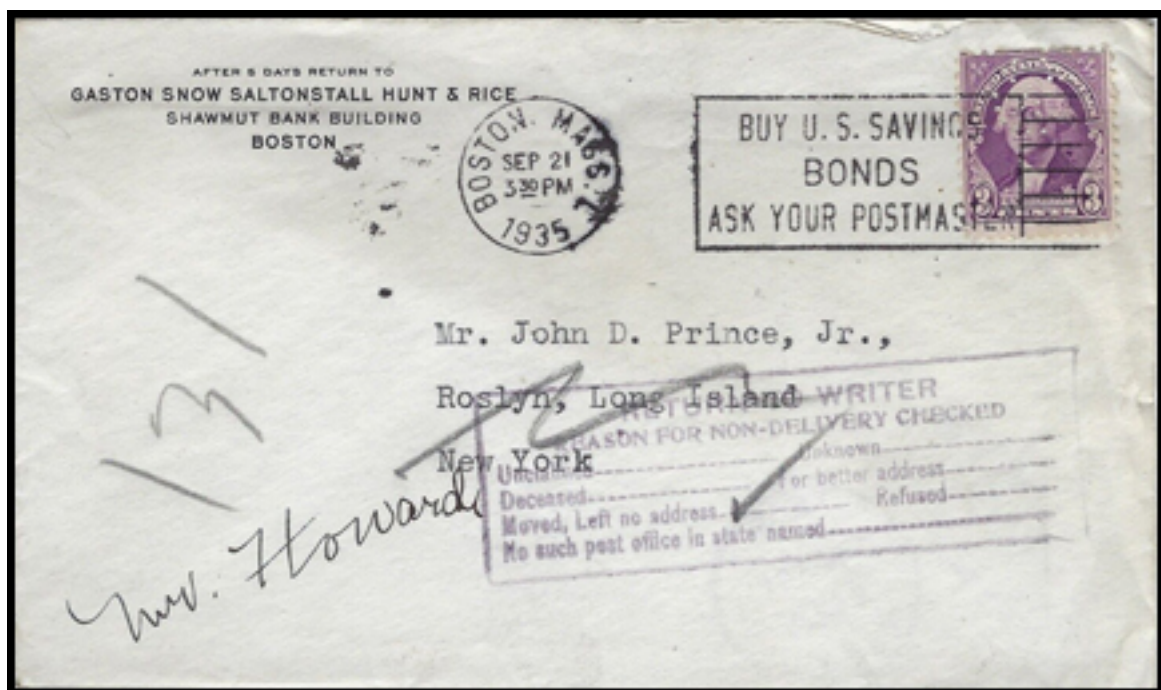

Did one of you members win this perfin cover on eBay around Halloween time?

If so, first-of-all, I want to apologize for costing you the extra \$5 at the end of the bidding. If I had known it was a fellow member I'd have stayed out of it.

From time to time, I scan through eBay at the perfin and precancel covers to see if anything interesting shows up. I also like to amuse myself looking at the "very rare" 4c Lincoln Liberty Issue perfin worth \$7,999, and Sc#804 Prexy worth \$1M. Kinda makes my day sometimes.

When I saw this cover, the long, crazy name "Gaston Snow Saltonstall Hunt & Rice" just piqued my interest for some reason. I just knew it had to be a law firm or accounting group. It was in the last few minutes of bidding and had stalled at \$2.50 for a couple of days. Someone and I started a bidding war in the last few seconds, and I lost at \$7.50.

Based on the corner card, I went to the "G" patterns and to the User Index without finding any information, even trying various versions of the names. And the perfin isn't easily identifiable from the picture.

It just looked like a fun project to get the cover and attempt to identify the perfin on it.

I am still trying to identify the perfin from the picture, but no luck yet. It doesn't have any resemblance to the names of the user company.

My next step is always to bug Steve Endicott with my question, and it's always a learning experience when he replies. He indicated that "...it was a common practice for a law firm (and I suppose others), to use the perfined postage from one of their clients."

If you won this cover and have had time to try to identify the perfin I would appreciate hearing from you as to what you found.

Patiently Pursuing the Posed Problem

Some information in response to Ramblings of a Newbie (#2)

I got interested in Dave Robinson's question and decided to attempt to locate the pattern in the *US Catalog*. Using the overlay procedure used before in this *Bulletin* I first extracted the pattern in the stamp from the cover shown in Dave's note. As seen below, it shows a pattern with only the remains of a pattern punched by a severely degraded perforator die.



My first thought was that, based on the gap in the circle at the right and the apparent crossbar, if inverted it might be one of the family of G072 patterns (G(E) – used by General Electric). However, only two of the 70+ patterns in this group have a three-hole crossbar in the “G”, and it was neither of these. So, maybe one of the many I043.7 (International Harvester) patterns; again, not. So then what about A030, A292, C235, C236, C248, C248A, C252, G1233, M105, M274, R173, Num. 17 through 18A, and several less likely candidates? All of these patterns have a circular outline, most being characters contained in a circle. A couple of exceptions are patterns composed only of letters forming a circular pattern. However, again, no matches were found.

At this point I returned to the overlay I had made of the fragment on another C pattern. The pattern in the stamp on cover is in fact similar enough to be a die variety of pattern C232, the C(NL) pattern used by the Columbian National Life Insurance Company.



A comparison of the unknown pattern (green) overlaid on the image of pattern C232 (black) is shown at the left. Note that the pattern above (as punched in the stamp) was inverted vertically (top-to-bottom) before being used in the overlay. Although very similar, the two patterns show differences primarily in the upper stroke of the “C” and the top hole in the “L”. Also, the agreement of these two patterns would require eight additional pins in the die which perforated the pattern in the stamp. Pin breakage explains the missing pins. So, I assume that the pattern was, as suggested by Steve, in a stamp sent to the firm as return postage for a response, which wasn't used for a return response to the Columbian National Life Insurance Company; but which was subsequently used on the cover to Mr. Prince.

As to the corner card of “Gaston Snow Saltonstall Hunt & Rice...”, I also, got interested in the history of the user.

The five names belong to partners in a *law firm* of the same name, with offices in the Shawmut Bank Building (below), located at the corner of Water & Congress Streets in Boston. The biographies of these five men follow.



William A. Gaston

William A. Gaston (1859 – 1927) – Son of William A. Gaston, Sr., governor of Massachusetts from 1875-1876, William Jr. graduated Harvard Law School and was admitted to the Bar in 1883. He then joined his father's law firm, Gaston and Whitney. The firm's name was changed to William Gaston and William Gaston in 1890. In 1896 he purchased the Boston Elevated Railway Company and, as president, organized the city's various street railways into a single entity; He raised the wages of employees and introduced worker compensation. He stepped down from this

position in 1899 due to his other business interests. He remained as chairman of the board until 1901. He became the largest single trustee of estates in Boston among those who did not pursue trusteeship as a career. He was a founding director of the National Shawmut Bank and was elected president of the Bank in 1907, which by then had become the largest bank in New England. Having survived the ‘Panic of 1907’, he remained its president until 1917; then served as chairman of the board until 1923.

Gaston was very active in politics beginning as a staff member to Massachusetts' Governor William Russell. From 1891 – 1893 he was Assistant Adjutant General of Massachusetts. In the election of 1903, he lost his first bid to become governor of Massachusetts.

He then served as an at large delegate to the 2004 Democratic National Convention and again considered running for governor. He did not make the second run for governorship and in late 1905 announced his retirement from politics.

He returned in 1910 as the candidate for the U.S. Senate but dropped out of this race. In 1912 he was nominated for the position of Secretary of the Navy but, again, was not selected. He was also mentioned as a possible member of the Federal Reserve Board of Governors. In 1918 he again announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Governor but lost in the primaries. In 1920 nomination papers as Governor were filed in his name, but he chose not to run. In 1922 he ran for the U.S. Senate seat then held by Henry Cabot Lodge, but this bid also failed (by fewer than 8,000/~411,000 votes). At the 1924 Democratic National Convention he was nominated as Vice President, but once again lost. His final [failed] bid for political office was made in 1926 when he was convinced to run for Lieutenant governor of the state of Massachusetts. His death in 1929 ended any further political aspirations. (Anon. 2023)

Frederick Elmer Snow (1864 - 1935) – He was admitted as partner to the firm in 1892, at which time the firm was again renamed as Gaston and Snow. No further information found except for the fact that he was named as one of the partners in the 1937 consolidated firm. (Anon. 2008).

Richard M. Saltonstall (1859 – 1922; pic at right) – Graduated Harvard U. in 1880; attended Harvard Law School for two years and left to study under Hon. Caleb Loring of Boston. He was admitted to the Massachusetts Bar in 1884. He joined the law firm in 1899. He was in the 10th generation of Harvard Grads in the family. (Anon. 1962a & 1962b).



Richard M. Saltonstall

Thomas Hunt (1866 – post-1937) – Graduated from Harvard U. with LL.B. in 1890. Admitted to practice law in 1890. No further information was found related to Mr. Hunt. (Schwarz 1937).

John Clark Rice, (1876 – Post 1937) – Graduated from Harvard U. with LL.B. in 1901. Admitted to the bar in 1901. In the 1937 *Who's Who in Law* he was listed in as a "Assoc. with Gaston, Snow & Saltonstall, and its successor firms since. Now a sr. mem. in Gaston, Snow, Saltonstall, Hunt & Rice." with "Office: 82 Devonshire St., Boston, Mass.". No other information was found about Mr. Rice. (Schwarz 1937).

As a postscript to the personal histories of the five partners listed in the corner card, in the October 21, 1937, issue of the *Boston Globe*, there is an announcement of the consolidation of two major law firms in Boston. The firms, Gaston, Snow, Saltonstall, Hunt & Rice, and, that of Lowering, Coolidge, Noble & Boyd, merged to form a new firm known as Gaston, Snow, Hunt, Rice & Boyd. The new firm had twenty partners, nine junior associates and an unreported number of support staff.

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PLE Used by the New York Central RR

John Williams (#4037)



Shown above is a double-rate cover strip to the General Electric Company from the NY Central Railroad office in Youngstown, Ohio; it is postmarked November 3, 1961. The Liberty series 4 cent Lincoln stamps (Sc#1036) are perfined PLE (P) for the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie RR. The PLE connected Pittsburgh with Youngstown and carried raw materials, heavy tonnage freight.

In 1880, Wm. Henry Vanderbilt brought the PLE into the New York Central system, which explains the apparent disconnect between the perfin and the return address. Wikipedia has an adequate article on the PLE.

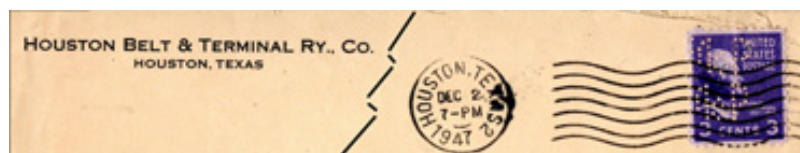
An Interesting Railroad-Related Cover Strip

In a recent note from Steve, he noted: "John Hart has found a strip of a cover that has two stamps attached and franked. One stamp has perfin P046.5 (PCL); the other stamp has P051 – both were used by The Pullman Company." Pattern P046.5 is reported as having been used in the St. Paul, MN office of the company while P051 (P/Co) is reported from the Chicago, IL office, with a supplemental use noted in Boston, MA. Lacking the postmark, it is impossible for me to guess which office used the other's perfin.

And Speaking of Railroad-Related Perfins

Paul Mistretta (LM#111), based on a note from Stephen Tauber (#2949)



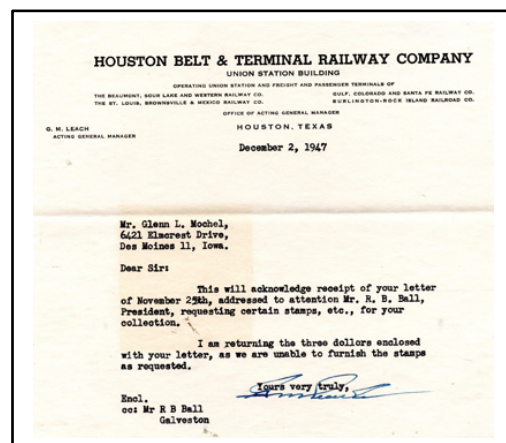
Stephen Tauber sent me a note reporting the discovery of a cover (cover strip Photoshop cropped above) documenting a supplemental user for pattern M190 (MoP) used by the Missouri Pacific Railroad Company (Texas Lines) with General Offices in Saint Louis, MO. The cover was found in the holdings of the Spellman Museum of Stamps and Postal History. It has a "Houston Belt & Terminal Ry., Co. / Houston, Texas" corner card. The cover can be taken as confirmation of a supplemental usage by that Railway of the "MoPac" pattern.

Beyond the new usage information, of interest is the contents of the letter. Envelope and letter are addressed to Mr. Glenn L. Mochel in De Moines, Iowa. The contents, (reduced and) reproduced at-the-right, piqued both Stephen's and my curiosity.

The letter was written to return \$3 sent to the Company's President, apparently requesting samples of their perfined stamps.

Here's some background related to this item.

- Mr. Mochel was a stamp collector, as is seen from the phrase "...for your collection." in the enclosure
- Further, he was a member of the Perfins Club (#102) from July 1946 to sometime in the 'Dark Ages' of the Club, the date range of



July 1947, to May 1952, the era during which no *Bulletins* were issued and for which no records remain of membership transactions

- *The Houston Belt & Terminal Ry. Co. is currently listed as a supplemental user of pattern H036 (H/B&T) with Hibernia Bank & Trust Co. of New Orleans, La. listed as its primary user*
- The letter falls very early in the ‘Dark Ages’ and it can be presumed that Mr. Mochel was still a member six months after he joined the Club, however,
- The Houston Belt & Terminal Ry., Co. was listed as the primary user of the pattern in Lougee’s 1966 and in the Baloughs’ 1979 *Catalog*. The primary user was changed, without explanation, in Randall’s 1998 *Catalog*
- Unfortunately, the pattern H/B&T fits both Hibernia Bank & Trust and Houston Belt & Terminal Co.
- Currently there is no image for H036 on cover on the Club’s website

All of this leaves us with a problem of identification of the primary user of the pattern. Was the inability of the Terminal Company to provide the requested stamps due to the fact that they, didn’t have any since they weren’t the primary user of the perfin? Was Mr. Mochel’s request based on a misidentification of the primary user?

Given the limited information to hand, it would appear that John was correct to override the 40+ year old identification and reassign the primary user of pattern H036 to the Hibernia Bank & Trust Co.

P.S.: A funny note, having nothing to do directly with this discussion, is a comment that I found on a chat board related to the Railway, in which the writer “Golden-Arm” recalls “...the **Hobo’s**, **Bums & Thieves** railroad, as we on the SP, in Houston called it...”

Spotted on HipStamp

Edited based on a note from Stephen Tauber (#2949)

Advertised on the HipStamp website by KurtS as “Canal Zone 73 MNH Perfin UN 1924 Washington Blk of 4 KS Philatelics (73CZUN0320).”, the block of four stamps is shown below. The base stamp is from the 4th Bureau issue and is purported to be overprinted for use in the Canal Zone (CZ Sc# 73). And all for a mere \$750.



The pattern appears to be U.S. U043 used by the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, NE. *Neither it, nor any similar pattern, is listed by Schwerdt as having been used in stamps of the Canal Zone.*

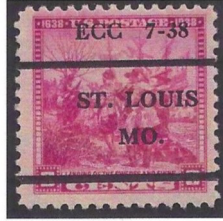
While Schwerdt’s work is now about 30 years old, this block raises a very serious question: is this a genuine perfin from the Canal Zone? Or, is it a forgery?

The quality of the images on HipStamp are too poor to answer the question. While all three elements of the perfin (U.S. stamp, perfin and overprint) *appear* genuine, the 72 dpi images are insufficient to determine much more. Without further information (\$750 is a heavy price tag to answer the question!) it is easy to speculate that the overprint is a recent addition to a legitimate mint block of U. S. stamps with the University of Nebraska perfin; an E rated pattern in a very cheap US stamp (Sc#605).

So, for this potential purchase, the simple recommendation is “Caveat Emptor” or “Let the Buyer Beware”. This is an extremely high price for a block of four inexpensive stamps with a highly questionable provenance.

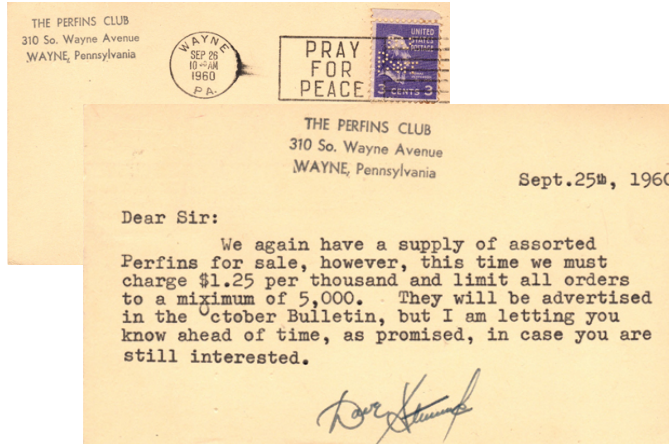
Errata

I could not guess how this group was originally formed, but there was an interesting clue. Among only a dozen covers the illustrated post card was included:

Does anybody need thousands of perfined Sc#807?

Ed. Note: The illustrated postcard was cancelled in Wayne, PA on Sept. 26, 1960. It is signed by Dave Stump who, at that time, was the Club's long-time Secretary-Treasurer.

In the note on the card, Dave refers to an ad to be published in the October issue of the *Bulletin*. The ad ran as promised and is quoted in part, below:

“Your Secretary will have another lot of several hundred thousand Perfins for sale at \$1.25 per thousand postpaid. These are well mixed and assorted, but are not for the collector who has over 2,000

different varieties in his collection. They will not be ready for shipment for about one month...

“On hand NOW, are about 50,000 from another source, ...”

So, the answer to Charlie's first question is that, yes – there are still several members who remember when serious bulk lots of unsorted, and often unpicked, perfins were available. And, the answer to Q.2 – at how much per 1,000?
